What imminent action of God in the life of the Hebrew people is envisioned in verses 5-7, given the context of the historical setting of this passage?

What does Yahweh teach about himself in verses 8-15?

What "saving act" of Yahweh is described briefly in verses 16 and 17?

What is the "new thing" God is about to do as outlined in verses 16-21?

How do verses 22-28 affirm both God's righteous judgment as well as God's grace and forgiveness?

Isaiah 44:6-23; God's Uniqueness and Superiority to Idols What claims of uniqueness does Yahweh make for Himself in verses 6-8?
In what ways does the prophet critique idols and those who fashion them with his satire in verses 9–20?
What "idols" exist in our world today? (which capture the focus, interest, time and energy ofpeople and which can become their "ultimate concern")
What is Israel asked to do in verses 21–23?
What spiritual practices can we make use of today to try to take seriously what the prophets teach us in the above verses?
